

The Gift that Keeps on Giving

During the Christmas season we exchange gifts—some useful, some thoughtful, and some forgotten by January. The fruit of the Spirit, however, is a very different kind of gift. When God grows this fruit in us, it becomes a gift that keeps on giving to everyone with whom we interact. When we think about the fruit of the Spirit, the Bible doesn't just give us descriptions. Rather, God gives us **people** who lived them out. One of the most beautiful examples is Ruth.

Ruth's story begins with loss, grief, and uncertainty. She had no guarantees, no long-term security, and no promise that life would get easier. Nevertheless, she displayed a life overflowing with the fruit of God's character long before Paul ever wrote about it in Galatians (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control). ***Which of these do you see in Ruth's story?***

In what area of your life is God asking you to show Ruth-like faithfulness, choosing obedience even without knowing how the story will unfold?

Ruth's life in Chapter 2 showed quiet but powerful fruitfulness. She didn't stand out through position or status but through her consistent character—her faithfulness to Naomi, her diligent work in the fields, her humility in accepting what was offered, and her kindness even in hardship. Ruth didn't know how God would use her obedience, but each small act of Spirit-shaped character became a seed that produced blessing beyond anything she imagined.

Which aspect of the fruit of the Spirit—love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, or self-control—is God calling you to cultivate in the “field” you're working in right now?

Ruth's encounter with Boaz in Chapter 3 revealed another dimension of her Spirit-shaped character. Instead of acting out of fear, manipulation, or desperation, she moved with dignity, humility, and integrity. Boaz recognized this immediately, praising her for a reputation marked by goodness and faithfulness. Ruth wasn't trying to prove herself; she was simply living out a life aligned with God's heart. That quiet, consistent character spoke loudly enough that an entire community took notice.

In your home or workplace, where might God be calling you to demonstrate goodness and integrity, trusting that a faithful reputation, built over time, brings honor to Him and opens doors you could never force on your own?

Lord, as we enter this season of giving, help us remember that the greatest gifts we offer are not found in packages but in the character You are forming within us. Just as Ruth's integrity blessed those around her, may our words and actions become gifts that reflect Your love. Use our faithfulness to shine Your light in our schools and homes this Christmas. Amen.

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
